Lenape or Delaware people (Len A' Pay)


- Name means "Original People"
- Have been in NJ for more than 12,000 years
- Lived in NJ, PA, NY Left around 1758
- North Jersey is the Munsee tribe and language
- South Jersey Lenape were Unami and spoke that language
- Other tribes called them "Grandfather"
- Called themselves "A Tribe of Women."
- First to encounter and exchange with the Europeans

A People With a Past Not of the past

Native Americans are not gone. They are not a people of the past They are people with a past.

Today there are more than **500 sovereign nations** (or tribes) There are 3-4 million Native Americans in the US


It is estimated that there were **15 million** in the year 1500

The Lenape were a matriarchal society

- Lineage was passed on through the mother's line
- Women could choose their own husband and the couple moved in with the bride's parents until they had their own place
- Divorce was permitted and the children stayed with the mother
- Division of labor:
- Women were in charge of agriculture, distribution of food Potterymaking, leather tanning

Men were hunters, warriors, cleared the fields,

Women had high status

- Spiritual leaders : handled rituals, ceremonies
- Healers: grew herbs and administered to sick

Diplomats/ambassadors/peacemakers

Irony of Civilization


- American women had to fight for rights for 144 years.
- In Lenape culture women had equal status with men for thousands of years
- European missionaries tried to change this because in western Christian traditions, women were considered to be inherently evil: (seducers, witches) who could not be trusted.
- In the 1600's historians also had difficulty grasping the concerpt of matriarchy and often misinterpreted observations

After the Seven Year War, ("French and Indian War") the Lenape left their ancestral homeland in the northeast and migrated west and north, as colonizing settlers pushed them further and further



Native American Civil Rights

- 1925 Native Americans became citizens of the U.S. but not all states gave voting rights
- 1965 Voting Rights act gave all Native Americans the right to vote

Ever-Changing "Facts" from the Past

1. Immigration Story (previously: via Bering Strait 15,000 years ago)

- In 2021 Archaeologists in New Mexico discovered footprints from 23,000 years ago
- Latest genetic research (2022) points to coastal arrivals

2. **1492**

- Christopher Columbus landed in Hispaniola/Haiti (Taino People) and claimed for Spain.
- Can be considered "Father of Globalization" and Columbian Exchange
- Beginning of empire building and competition among white European countries

3. 1493: Pope Alexander VI issues Papal Bull: **Doctrine of Discovery,** endorses conquest of lands Inhabited by non-Christian indigenous people

4. Annihilation

Indigenous population estimated at **15 million people** (North America) Today they number 3-4 million

5. 1801: Thomas Jefferson---Manifest Destiny

Universal Attitudes of Colonizers

Indigenous people are marginalized groups in many countries of the world, not only the U.S. Many tribes are matriarchal.

They have often been subjected to "cultural assimilation" by colonizing powers and forced to attend schools in which they are forbidden to speak their native language and where their traditional cultural values are condemned as "savage" and superstitious.

Students assembled at the **Carlisle Industrial School** circa 1900. Founded in Carlisle Pennsylvania in 1879 by Lieutenant Richard Henry Pratt whose well-known motto was "Kill the Indian, Save the Man." It was the flagship Indian Boarding School from 1879 to 1918.
